



After means when something happens later than something else, or when someone or something is standing behind someone/something else.

Look at the examples on the top of this page.

In the first picture, "C" is after "A" and "B." "C" is after because we read from the left to the right and so we read "C" after we read "A" and "B."

In the second picture, the dot on the right is after the dot on the left because we always look left to right.

In the third picture, the red dot is on the clock after the new hour starts.

In the last picture, the girl on top has not brushed her hair. You could say at the top picture is of the girl before she brushed her hair. The bottom picture shows the girl "after" she brushed her hair. In that picture, the word "after" means that it happened later than something else.

One other example: If you are last in line, you are "after" everyone else.
