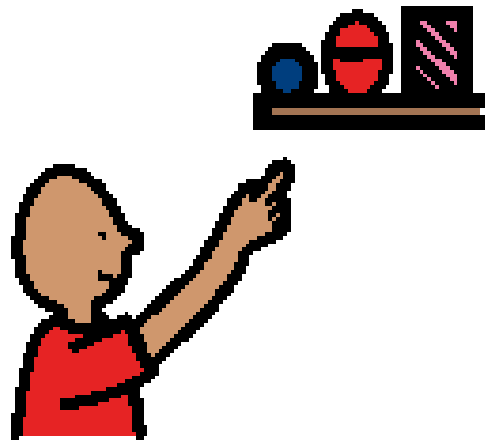

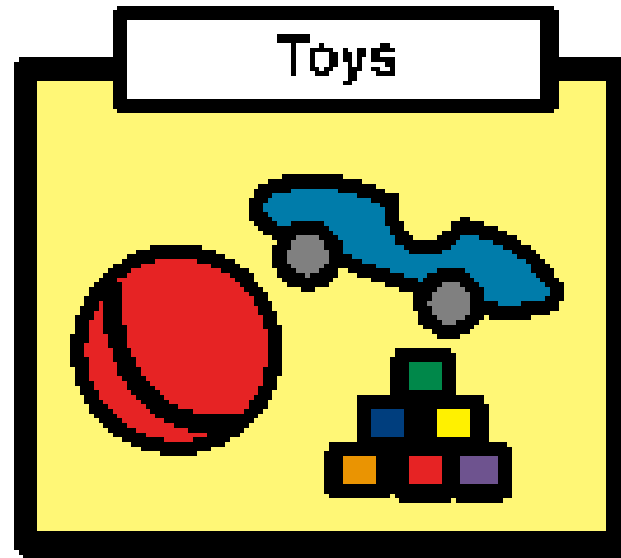

# I want that



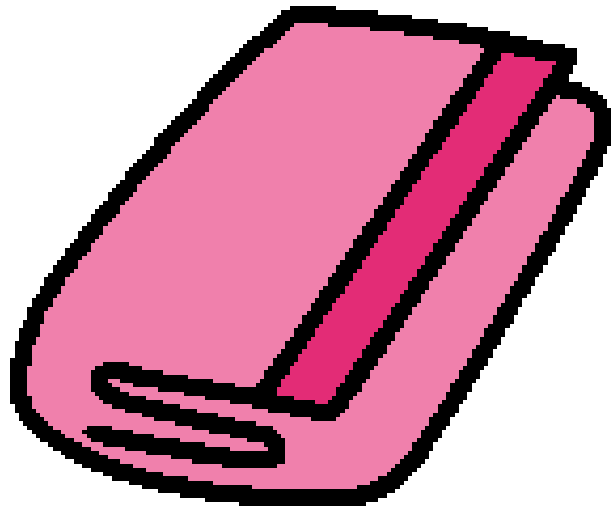
Sometimes someone has something I want to play with. When someone has a toy I want to play with I can ask them to share.

toy



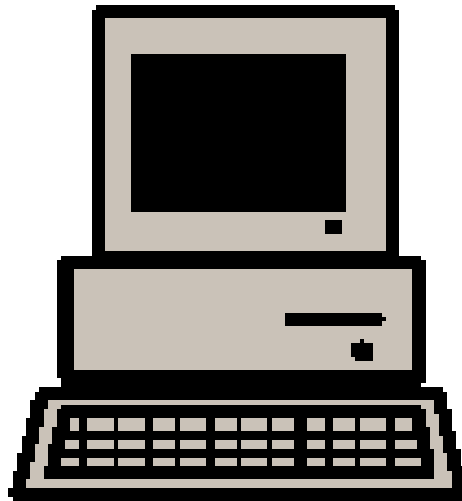
I may want to share a toy or a game.

blanket



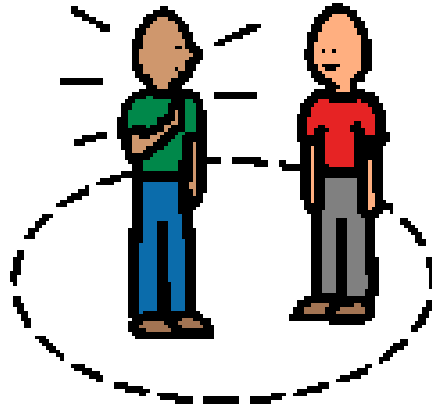
I may want to share a blanket.

computer



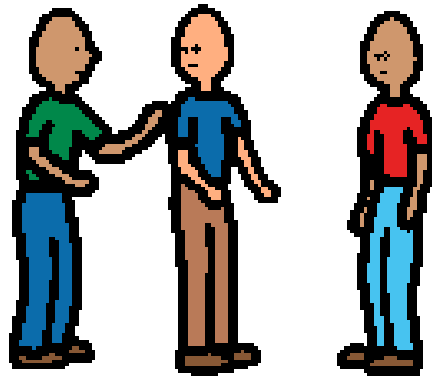
I may want to use the computer.

my turn



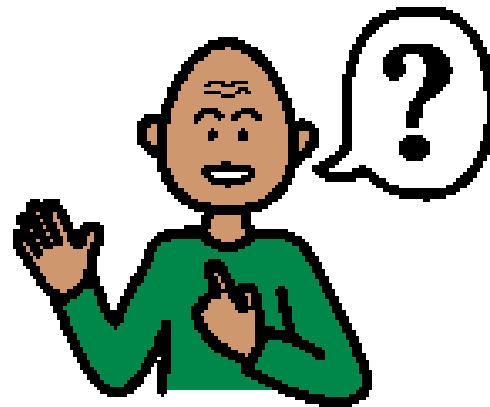
When I want a turn using something

excuse me



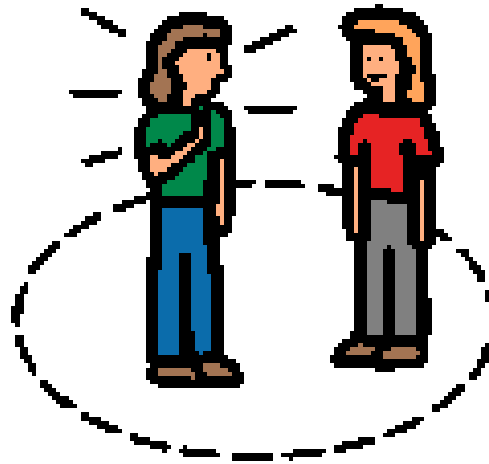
When I ask to share I can walk up to my friend and get their attention. I can look them in the eyes and say “excuse me.”

Can I have a turn?



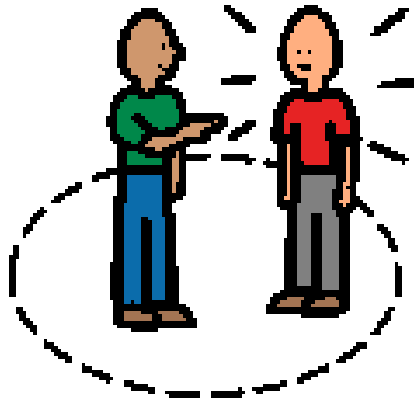
I can ask them for a turn. I can say “Can I have a turn please?” or “Can I please play with that?”

my turn



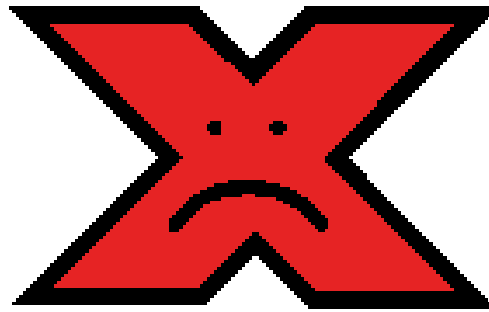
If my friend says “yes” I can say thank you

your turn



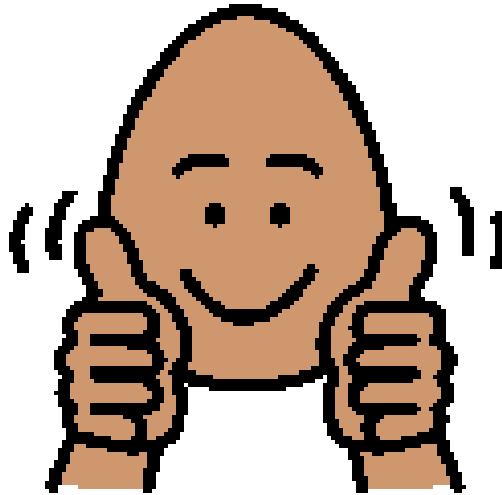
